Easter worship is "To Be Announced".

Book Nook - The Greatest Story Ever Told

A new book is coming soon to the Book Nook library in the church. The Story: the Bible as on continuing story of God and his People with a forward by Max Lucado and Randy Frazee is a very readable and accessible format of the familiar words of the Bible.

From the flyleaf of the book:

God goes to great lengths to rescue lost and hurting people. That is what *The Story* is all about – the story of the Bible. Gods' great love affair with humanity. Condensed into 31 accessible chapters, it sweeps into the unfolding progression of Bible


characters and events from Genesis to Revelation.
Using the clear accessible text of the Revised
Standard version of the
Bible, it allows the stories, poems, and teachings of the Bible to read like a novel. And like in any good story, it is filled with intrigue, drama, conflict, romance, and redemption!

The Story is made up of direct quoted sections of the Bible with no citations or divisions into "books" of the Bible (ie the book of Mathew or Luke) with added brief synopsis of what is omitted to blend it into one novel.

If you or someone you

know has trouble reading the Bible because of all the notes and numbers and difficult cultural references from ancient times, this is a great alternative. Same words, different form... try it, you might like it!

Musical Notes - The finest hymn

Reginald Heber (1783-1826), a vicar and hymn-writer in England, was the first person to compile a hymnal based around the church calendar. He composed the beloved hymn "Holy, Holy, Holy" specifically for Trinity Sunday, with lyrics based on Revelation 4:8-11.

Holy, holy, holy! Lord God Almighty! Early in the morning our song shall rise to Thee; Holy, holy, holy, merciful and mighty! God in three Persons, blessed Trinity! The joyful song celebrates the eternal, omnipotent Triune God. Throughout the verses, Heber used units of three to symbolize the Trinity (God is "perfect in power, in love and purity"; God is worshiped by saints, cherubim and seraphim; and he's praised "in earth and sky and sea").

Heber, who witnessed much idol worship while serving as Bishop of Calcutta, often reaffirmed God's holiness in his hymns. British poet laureate Alfred Lord Tennyson so admired the uplifting language in "Holy, Holy, Holy" that he proclaimed it the finest hymn ever written.

"What's wrong with me,


that I can't seem to find Easter?"

The committee has taken us around the world with some of their projects, such as The Heifer Project, Operation Christmas Child, Holy Joe's Cafe, and Fair Trade goods. They have worked closer to home in Boston at Seafarers Mission, providing Church World Services with disaster relief kits, and the Souhegan Valley Crop Walk. In town, they support the Open Cupboard Pantry, provide scholarships to high school seniors going to college and help local families in need. And they support the

groups that make prayer shawls, prayer beads and blankets for the Linus Project.

Newsletter items: news or creative writing welcome. Submission information is below.


