# Standing firm in faith



"We can see one another's faces instead of the back of their heads!" So, as I write this letter, it occurs to me that it's been four months since we gathered "in person" and for some it may feel like an eternity! When we gather now on Sunday morning via zoom, or a book group via zoom, or a board or committee, the conversation eventually turns to "when do you think we will gather in church?" I know for me I have been a little (okay, a lot) preoccupied with how coronavirus events have impacted and even upset what was a normal life. In some cases, it has turned into some kind of phobia: am I going to get <u>it</u>, will I pass *it* on to some unexpected person??

How does one get out of the funk of being so caught up with all this depressing news? It occurred to me that we are not the first generation to have challenges of this kind.

I am reminded of Exodus Chapter 14. I would encourage you to read the entire chapter, but verses 10-14, when the Israelites complained to Moses, "why did you bring us out here, were there no graves in Egypt, so we can die in the desert? Moses answered, do not be afraid, stand firm and see the deliverance the Lord will bring you today" (paraphrased).

It is in our darkest hour that we should be "standing firm" in our faith, it is only natural that we would call out to our God in times of distress, concern or worry. But what if we turn it around? What if we try and see some of the things that this situation has provided to us and for us? The Zoom service has become a way for people to chat with one another and in some cases with people that they might never have been able to. We can see one another's face instead of the back of their heads! If you are downloading the bulletin, you have a hard copy that perhaps you normally would recycle of leave

behind, but now can read it at your leisure and refer to it during the week.

Understandably we can't give the reassuring hug to those who have to stay away, but from what I have heard, people are making time to "FaceTime" with grandchildren and other family members, which requires an intentional time of attention, a time to really connect as opposed to just going through the motions.

I believe that if you focus on the good things that this has done for us (not to us), we will come out of this stronger in our faith and my hope is that we will be an even stronger faith community.

That is a good question with no easy answer. As New Hampshire Governor Chris Sununu eases the coronavirus restrictions on what can be opened and at what capacity and with what guidelines, everyone at our small church wonders when things will get back to normal. Right now normal is social distancing and wearing masks. But there are also those other restrictions and guidelines that need to be considered.

The Church Council agreed to meet again in July via Zoom, to discuss what the current conditions are and the feasibility of "live" worship and when. Normally the council does not meet in July or August. We just want you to know that we are working on a safe solution to these questions.

# Book Nook - Encouraging Words



# Musical Notes - The "Wow!" factor

After the final notes concluded at a recent symphony performance in Boston, the conductor hadn't yet lowered his baton when a child exclaimed, "Wow!" The break in protocol, magnified by excellent acoustics, didn't upset the participants or audience, however. Instead, several later said it brought them great joy. One even called the moment life-changing.

The incident was especially meaningful because the child, a 9-year-old named Ronan, has autism and is generally nonverbal. Music, his family says, tends to attract his interest and make him happy. When symphony officials learned Ronan's identity, they arranged a private performance so he could meet some musicians.

How often do you shout "Wow!" — in a good way — at what you see and hear? You may tend to do so on vacation or while observing God's natural wonders, but what about during your day-to-day life? Think about the people you encounter and their talents — and your own. When have these sparked a "Wow!" of thanks to God?

Every blessing, large or small, is a wow-moment — a gift from God that warrants our praise.

### Meet your church: Delegates

As described in the Church By-Laws, "There shall be three delegates to represent the church at the meetings of the Hillsborough Association and the annual meeting of the New Hampshire Conference of the United Church of Christ."

The by-laws further describe how these delegates shall be members of the church, as they represent Second Congregational Church in these meetings and vote on the church's behalf. They also report back to the Church Council on the proceedings of both conference and association. Our Delegates represent us at both the Hillsborough Association and the NH Conference of the UCC. These are the local and state organizations that bring our local, independent churches together to oversee students on the pathway to becoming pastors, provide education and sharing of information, do missions work, and provide resources to our churches.

Delegates attend the annual meetings, with worship services, of each organization. They vote on budgets, officers and resolutions. They may be asked to serve on committees. In addition, the delegates represent our church at Ecclesiastical Councils, Ordinations, and Installations of pastors.

Currently, there are delegate positions open . If you think you could fill one of those positions, please talk to the Nominating Committee: Jane Herlihy or Leslie Tuttle. Or you can speak to Moderator Marilyn Warner, who has also been a delegate in the past and can provide some additional insight on the post.
