The Search Committee's Kick-Off meeting was held on June 24 via Zoom with the Reverend Richard Slater at the New Hampshire Conference UCC leading. Reverend Slater reviewed the resources available on the NH UCC website and who is there to assist us along the way. He gave us an overview of the process. We need to create a profile to go on the website, which will be posted on the NH and national UCC websites, we'll interview candidates, pick one and all done! Okay, it's not going to be that easy! Rev Slater indicates it could take 3-4 months to complete just the profile.

The Committee has met almost weekly since then, getting the groundwork laid to do all that.

Massachusetts Peace Action, Veterans for Peace - NH Chapter, NH Building a
Culture of Peace Forum, American Friends Service Committee-NH Program

Every year, all over the world, people gather to remember the atomic bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. On the seventy-fifth anniversary of those bombings, gather with American and international peace groups, for a live streaming remembrance hosted by Kevin Martin, President of Peace Action, the ceremony will be led by Reverend Liz Theoharis co-chair of the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival, and will feature Masako Wada, who was a young girl in Nagasaki and survived the bombing, she is now the Assistant Secretary General of Nihon Hidankyo, the Japanese organization of survivors of Hiroshima and Nagasaki.

## ONA - Open and Affirming

We want to rekindle our case for becoming an ONA congregation. There are some webinars coming up in the next few months that discuss how and why congregations choose the path to publicly make the declaration. Pastor Kerry has also met with the group and continues to support everyone in the congregation, regardless of their position on this issue.

It is not safe right now to meet and discuss in person. Next month we hope to meet as a committee and then have open discussions on the zoom platform this fall. Stay tuned.... In the meantime here are some thoughts on the process.

Q. What can I expect in an ONA church?

## A. A community of faith where you and your family are safe!

Because each congregation in the United Church of Christ is independent, and therefore free to make its own decisions, there is a broad diversity of theology and practice in our tradition. In the UCC, there is no hierarchy that can impose uniformity on our churches. Each ONA congregation has independently adopted an Open and Affirming covenant after a journey of dialogue, study and prayer. There are differences between congregations, but generally, an ONA

- l. is a safe space for open and honest conversation about human sexuality and gender identity.
- 2. encourages LGBTQ members to serve in lay and ordained leadership.
- 3. celebrates same-sex weddings.



#### Musical Notes - God's mysterious ways



"God moves in a mysterious way, his wonders to perform." These oft-quoted words, from a hymn by English poet William Cowper, come with an unsubstantiated yet powerful back story.

Cowper, who struggled with depression, decided to commit suicide one night. He called a cab to go to the Thames River, planning to drown himself. Such dense fog arose that the driver got lost and finally stopped to let his passenger out. To Cowper's surprise, he was at his own door! He concluded that God had sent the fog to spare his life. The hymn he wrote in response continues:

Ye fearful saints, fresh courage take; the clouds ye so much dread are big with mercy and shall break in blessings on your head. ...

His purposes will ripen fast, unfolding every hour. The bud may have a bitter taste, but sweet will be the flower.

#### Meet your church: Trustees

The Trustees of our church consists of five members: The Clerk and Treasurer plus three other members.

They have general care of the church's funds and are responsible for the maintenance of the physical property of the church.

They are described in the by-laws as prudential officers. They oversee the trust funds and endowments of the church, and make sure they are invested properly. They make sure the income is collected and used according to the terms

of the trusts and the instruction of the church.

They have the authority to accept or reject gifts and bequests (either property or monies), and further having oversight of the enforcement of the terms of the gifts/bequests.

The Trustees have no authority to make any essential alterations, physical or fiduciary, without a directing vote of the church (church council).

Additionally, the Trustees provide for the employment of the custodian, as needed.

One Trustee is to be elected at each Annual Meeting for three years.

Currently, the Trustees consist of Joshua Bartsch, Peter Ouellette, and Jim Tuttle, plus Clerk Leslie Tuttle and Treasurer Dana Dahl

The Trustees do lots of "behind the scenes" work. You'd be surprised at the scope of tasks they take on, from keeping the building operational with roof repairs, new furnace, and safety inspections to overseeing grant writing.

#### On God's side

Ever been picked last for a team? Eugene Peterson recounts feeling like a "liability" when this happened to him. In Run With the Horses (IVP Books), he says God always wants us on his side — no matter our individual strengths or weaknesses:

"For a long time all Christians called each other 'saints.' They were all saints regardless of how well or badly they lived, of how experienced or inexperienced they were. The word saint did not refer to the quality or virtue of their acts, but to the kind of life to which they had been chosen, life on a battlefield. It was not a title given after a spectacular performance, but a mark of whose side they were on."

Based on its Latin roots, saint is the noun form of the verb consecrate; in other words, Peterson adds, God gave us "spiritual shape" even before we had "biological shape" (see Jeremiah 1:5). Even before forming us, God set us apart, or consecrated us, as saints — and chose us to be on his side.

#### Lively or lifeless?

When Eugene Peterson was a seminary student, he met Willi Ossa, a German-born artist who worked as a church janitor by night. Ossa thought all Christians were hypocrites because the ones he knew in his homeland had supported Nazis.

In Run With the Horses (IVP Books), Peterson writes that Ossa

warned him not to become a pastor because "the church squeezed the spirit and morality" out of people. When Ossa painted Peterson's portrait, the flat eyes and gaunt face served as a "prophetic warning" about what might happen to him.

Peterson kept the portrait, often comparing it to what he saw in the

mirror. The painting, he says, "shows me what I become if I drift from or deny a personal faith in a merciful God." NN 6.16


