
If you would please let us know what you will donate, then the items can be added to the sale list. Our intent is to have photos, when possible, and descriptions of items for sale.

ONA - What would a covenant look like?

Last month we discussed what a covenant could look like for an open and affirming congregation. Per the Open and Affirming Coalition of the UCC, "An Open and Affirming covenant is more than a statement, policy, declaration or an amendment to a congregation's by-laws. In the UCC's Reformed tradition, a covenant is an act of faith, a solemn promise to God in response to God's holy Word. An ONA covenant is a serious step for a congregation in its life of faith."

Are we willing to publicly state what we already practice in our church every week? We have always welcomed people into our church regardless of their race, culture, age,

ability and social standing. What will we risk if we say this aloud?

UCC, Boxborough MA's covenant states, in part, "We are an Open and Affirming (ONA) church, believing that each of us is created in God's image. We celebrate everyone, including people of all ages, races, cultures, sexual orientations, gender identities and expressions, family configurations, economic circumstances, physical, cognitive or emotional abilities, education, or spiritual and religious traditions. All are welcome to participate fully in the life, leadership, ministry and mission of this church as we seek to grow together in a safe and nurturing community of faith. We

strive to demonstrate in all ways that "no matter who you are or where you are on life's journey, you are welcome here!"

These covenants may not fit our needs, but they are an excellent example of what our covenant might include. The committee welcomes your comments. Please feel free to contact any one of us to discuss further.

Book Nook - Open to the Holy Spirit

Open to the Spirit: God in Us, God with Us, God transforming Us, by Biblical scholar and teacher Scot McKnight, is a straightforward examination of what the Bible says about the Holy Spirit, the often confusing member of the Trinity. Through Biblical study, theology, and life experience he seeks to answer such questions as: Who exactly is the Holy Spirit? What does the Holy Spirit do in our lives? How can we know the Holy Spirit more deeply? Is it possible to be aware of the Holy Spirit's promptings and to act on these


promptings in our lives, our churches, our world?

"Many today have little patience with the church, but they love Jesus. They have concluded that if Jesus believes it, they are all for it. So let's start there. What did Jesus believe about the Spirit? What did Jesus know about the Spirit? How did Jesus practice the Spirit? More importantly was Jesus open to the Spirit?" p. 8

"Each of us is designed by God to be receptive to the Spirit. We are spirit-ual beings. We can, with free will, choose to be open or we can be shut or we can be a little bit open and whole lot shut but we cannot as Christians deny our design. If we deprive ourselves of knowing the Holy Spirit, and refuse to open to the changes that occur when we seek to know the Holy Spirit, then we are refusing to walk with Jesus, refusing to become more like Christ." p. 8


Here are a few verses, which can also serve as prayers:

Guidelines for in-person church services (subject to change)

Face masks are required and will be available if someone forgets theirs or doesn't have one.

Hand sanitizer will be available in convenient locations

Floors will be marked with tape at 6' intervals to help people with their social distancing

Temperature will be taken of everyone attending - any temp over 100.4 cannot be allowed in.

Attendance will be taken at each service

Deacons will seat people, seating from front to back - then at end of service leave back to front.

Pews will be marked with tape at 6' intervals to keep the social distancing. Family units can sit together, which may require a quick adjustment of the "other" 6' space

Bulletins will already be in the pews - bibles and hymnals have been removed. Please bring your own Bible from home instead.

Offerings can be left in the pew or continued to be mailed in

While the weather is good - have windows and doors will be open .

People can sign up to be the responsive reader & scripture reader (they would do both). They would sit up front on the altar for the whole service and do their readings from there. There is still more than 6' of distance with Kerry up there

The bathrooms – cleaner is available for people to wipe down areas before and after their use.

If you test positive for the coronavirus, please stay home.

Do not come if you don't feel well.

Do not come if you exhibit any symptoms of sickness, including sore throats, coughing, fevers, etc. Please keep us all safe

Please tell us if you test positive for the coronavirus.

Thank you for your cooperation as we work through all of this together.

Guidelines will be strictly adhered to and are subject to changes. People not respecting the guidelines will be asked to leave.
