Costs are rising all across the board. With the price of heating oil hovering around \$5.00 per gallon, everyone needs to pay attention to the thermostats and making sure they are turned down to 60 degrees before leaving the building. The twenty-four hour food pantry shed that we discussed last month has been put on hold.

The shed was to be constructed on the Wilton -Lyndeborough Day of Service in October. There was some concern about lot line set backs and a couple of other things. This will be revisited in the future once the logistics are sorted out.

Your mission dollars at work - A Day of Service

Wilton-LyndeboroughDay of ServiceOn October 15, churchmissions worked inconjunction with theCollaborative Space and theWilton Community Center tosponsor a day of service. Itwas very successful!

We had 44 volunteers work on a variety of projects, including stenciling storm drains in town, a walk for the Open Cupboard, weeding invasive plants by the River Walk, assisting a veteran with yard work, clearing trails and brush at the reservoir and painting the Still Good Shed at the recycling center. At the end of the day Church Missions served a spaghetti supper to members of the community, free of charge, as a thank you. The project raised over \$1,250.00. All proceeds will go to the Open Cupboard. Everyone who participated agreed that the day was a success.

<u>Project Linus</u>

The group continues to meet on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month. There is an average of 7 people at each gathering. Together, the group completes 15 - 20 blankets each month. These are brought to the Monadnock Regional Coordinator who helps distribute to area hospitals, police and fire departments, and Head Starts. We welcome anyone to join the group.

Future projects will include Thanksgiving and Christmas gift bags of cheer for some of our members who are not always able to attend service.

A veteran's service

American hero Eddie Rickenbacker (1890-1973) led a life of daring and risk, from race car driving as a teen to piloting warplanes. Throughout his experiences, Rickenbacker grew in faith while discovering that "life had no meaning except in terms of helping others."

In the first issue of *Guideposts* magazine, Rickenbacker described spending four

agonizing months in 941 in the hospital after an accident. While recovering he pondered life and death, concluding that he couldn't give up because he still "had work to do, others to serve."

Less than two years later, that ordeal came in handy. After crashing in the South Pacific, Rickenbacker and "seven other starving men" were adrift on a raft for 21 days. Most were "so young they needed the strength and understanding of a man who had been down in the valley of the shadow, who has suffered and made sense out of his suffering," he said. "It was clear to me that God had a purpose for keeping me alive. I had been saved to serve."
