Come to Candidate Sunday on May 14

The Settled Pastor Search Committee is pleased to announce we are recommending that the Second Congregational Church, UCC of Wilton, NH extend a Call to the Reverend Gary W. Klingsporn, Ph.D. to be our Settled Pastor.

Part of the process is Candidate Sunday, on May 14. Reverend Gary will conduct our worship service after which an all-church meeting will be held for the congregation to vote on extending the call. Please make a point to be there for this important vote. Below is part Reverend Gary's biography:

Reverend Dr. Gary Klingsporn recently retired from full-time parish ministry, having served the past twelve years as Senior Minister of the First Congregational Church in Nantucket, MA. Gary and his wife Debra live in Manchester, NH

Earlier in his career, while a graduate student, he served Baptist, Presbyterian, and Lutheran churches. In 1988 he accepted a call to Colonial Church of Edina a large Congregational church in Minneapolis where he served for twenty years as Teaching Minister and Minister of Spiritual Formation. As a senior member of that multiple staff church he engaged in all aspects of pastoral ministry including teaching, worship, preaching, and pastoral care.

Rev. Gary did his doctoral work at Baylor University in Waco, Texas, where he received his Ph.D. in New Testament studies in 1985. He has taught biblical studies in academic settings and served as General Editor of the multivolume book series *The Library of Distinctive Sermons*.

Reverend Gary is excited about continuing his next call to ministry as a part-time settled pastor, doing what he loves most — preaching and teaching, loving and caring for people, and equipping God's people to be ministers to the world.

#### Ruth - a Pentecost story?

The disciples were celebrating Pentecost, originally a Jewish festival, when the Holy Spirit descended on them and birthed the church.

Pentecost, which began as a harvest festival, had come to commemorate the giving of the law. The book of Ruth became integral to festival worship.

Why Ruth? This short story doesn't mention the law, let alone God giving it to Moses. Yet in Ruth's devotion to her mother-in-law ("Where you go I will go .... Your people will be

my people ... " [Ruth 1:16, NIV]), she fulfills not just the letter but the spirit of the law: lovingkindness — all the more remarkable because she's a foreigner. Boaz, too, demonstrates exorbitant kindness to Ruth.

As Christians celebrate the Spirit bridging differences in Jerusalem, uniting all nationalities by making the gospel message intelligible to all people, we too can remember Ruth's story. For in it, God unites two enemy peoples for his grand purpose: Boaz and Ruth's marriage leads to King

David and, ultimately, to King Jesus. Today, the Holy Spirit continues to unite all categories of people under Christ's reign for the good of the world.

## We Remember

More than 150 years ago, Memorial Day took shape amid the backdrop of the U.S. Civil War. Before it ended, women began decorating the graves of fallen soldiers. In 1868, when May 30 was designated as Decoration Day, loved ones placed flowers on the graves of Union and Confederate soldiers alike.

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to be observed on the last Monday in May. On Memorial Day, we pause to

remember people who made the ultimate sacrifice for their country and for our freedom. We also pray for those who continue serving, especially those in harm's way.
