



A Mother's Day Remembrance

For Mothers Day this year, I have been thinking about my own grandmother. Grammy Daley was a mother and grandmother to all who passed through her doors. She raised eleven children of her own and cared for many more, including several grandchildren and a few others when parents were not available.

Everyone spoke of Grammy with love and affection. Often gratitude was expressed for beds or meals offered when someone was down on their luck. No one went away hungry. There was always room for one more.

At her funeral in 1975, her priest, Father Comtois, described her with these words taken from Proverbs Chapter 31:

"She is worth more than precious gems. ... She is an energetic hard worker and watches for bargains. She works far into the night... She reaches out her hands to the poor and extends her arms to the needy... She is really a woman of strength and dignity. When she speaks her words are wise, and kindness is the rule for everything she says. .. Her children stand and bless her. They praise her with these words. There are many fine women in the world, but you are the best of them all."

Father Comtois added his own thoughts to Grammy's homily: "By her kindness, sincerity, and honesty, she knew how to win the hearts of her friends and neighbors, and everybody who knew her loved her in return. But what struck me most was the sincere affection, devotion, love and concern that each of her children lavish on their mother."

Grammy Daley died at the age of ninety, when I was only fifteen. Her legacy to me and the rest of the family, is still felt deeply. I cherish the short time I had with her. I strive to be even half the woman she was and I can only hope to have such an impact on my own family.

Father Comtois added the following message as directed by my grandmother and even though it was her farewell prayer to us, it speaks to me today just as importantly as it did fifty years ago:

"My dear children, love one another, seek what unites not what may seem to separate you from the other. As I take leave or better still, as I say until we meet again, let me remind you of the most important things in life. Our blessed Savior, Jesus, His gospel, His Holy Church. I shall remember all, and you, in return, pray for me."

Thank you for letting me share these thoughts. Happy Mothers Day to all and many blessings.

Book Nook: The Sunflower

"You are a prisoner in a concentration camp. A dying Nazi soldier asks for your forgiveness. What would you do?

While imprisoned in a Nazi concentration camp, Simon Wiesenthal was taken one day from his work detail to the bedside of a dying member of the SS. Haunted by the crimes in which he had participated, the soldier wanted to confess to--and obtain absolution from--a Jew. Faced with the choice between compassion and justice, silence and truth, Wiesenthal said nothing. But even years after the war had ended, he wondered: Had he done the right thing? What would you have done in his place?

In this important book, fifty-three distinguished men and women respond to Wiesenthal's questions. They are theologians, political leaders, writers, jurists, psychiatrists, human rights activists, Holocaust survivors, and victims of attempted genocides in Bosnia, Cambodia, China and Tibet. 

Musical Notes: Keep Trying

In *The God Who Stays*, contemporary Christian musician Matthew West writes about the pandemic's fear-filled early days. After his concert tour was abruptly canceled in March 2020, he rode to an airport "feeling utterly hopeless about a world that was spinning out of control."

Then Arthur, his ride-share driver, began singing along to the radio — and the song happened to be West's "The God Who Stays." West joined in, jokingly asking how he sounded. "Not so good," Arthur replied, not knowing West's identity. "You keep trying."

The driver shared how those lyrics uplifted him during life's difficulties, and West later recalled that conversation during lockdown, while wondering where God was. The musician realized he had "settled for a socially distant relationship with the One who is nearer than I dare to believe, closer than the air I breathe." But West pictured "God running toward me with open arms like the prodigal's father," and he resolved to keep trying — and to grow closer to the God who always stays. 7.23

Reflecting on Resurrection

In *Rest Your Dreams on a Little Twig*, poet Joyce Rupp finds in spring flowers the proclamation of the gospel: "we who have died / are alive today." In another poem in the same volume, she writes: "A green shoot grows / out of an old tree stump, / announcing to the world / that power lies within death."

As you move about outdoors these springtime days in the northern hemisphere, where do you see nature testifying to resurrection? Where is evidence that what seemed dead — bare branches, dry grass, inactive seeds — was not in fact the final word? What encourages you to believe in renewal, second chances, life that blossoms from death? In what ways are you, who had died, alive today? Part of your life that felt like an old stump might be sprouting green shoots after all!
